



Learning Project WEEK 6 – Pizza	
Age Range: EYFS	
Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
• Watch a Numberblocks clip each day at: BBC or CBeebies. Use this guide here to give you ideas on what to do with your children whilst watching an episode. • Working on Numbots - your child will have an individual login to access this. • Play the Numberblocks pattern spotting game. • Practise counting up to 20. This can be done through playing hide and seek, singing number songs, chanting, board games etc. • Listen to a number song from the CBeebies website. After listening to them, watch again and sing along if you can. Talk about the maths you can see in the video clip.	• Read a variety of books at home. Favourites can be repeated. Hearing the patterns of language in a story will support your child's language development. • Reception age children: Children to read to parents daily. Visit Oxford Owl for free eBooks that link to your child's book band. You can create a free account at: https://www.oxfordowl.co.uk/for-home/ Complete the linked Play activities for each book. • With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for the tricky words they are currently learning. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.

Weekly Phonics Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
• Sing Nursery Rhymes and songs together. Add in actions and change the words. Can children think of different rhyming words to add in? Repeat old favourites and learn new rhymes. You can find an A-Z of Nursery Rhymes here: https://allnurseryrhymes.com/ • Daily phonics - Practice the sounds your child is working on and blend words. This can be oral blending (e.g. spoken out loud c-a-t) or written if appropriate. Interactive games found on link below. https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk/ • Play I-spy with things you can see out of the window. You could alternate between the initial sound in the word e.g. <i>"I spy with my little eye something beginning with t"</i>. Or with oral blending e.g. <i>"I spy with my little eye a t-r-ee"</i> • Play a listening game- Gather a selection of objects that make sounds from around the house. Cover your child's eyes with a blindfold and make sounds with the objects collected. Can they figure out what the object is without looking at it?	• Practice name writing. Can they write their first name? Middle name? Surname? • Practice forming the letters of the alphabet. Follow your school's script. • Ask your child to write out the tricky words they are working on at the moment on pieces of paper and turn them into a pairs game. • Ask your child to draw or write a shopping list to help plan for the weekly shop. Encourage them to ask all family members views on what they would like to eat that week. • Ask your child to help plan a movie night/ afternoon. Select two films from a streaming service or DVD's you have in the house. Ask them to draw a picture to represent each film or write out the title. Ask them to speak to each member of the house to find out their view on which film they would like to watch. Ask your child to write each person's name under their chosen film.

Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

This week in school we would normally be learning about Pizza. We have tried our best to suggest activities that are similar to those that we would be doing in school. Each day, we will post a daily sound and number activity to complement this. We have suggested some things off Twinkl, but are mindful that not all families will have access to printers, or have limited availability. Please do not underestimate the value of the conversation you will be having with your child on a daily basis. Language acquisition is a really powerful educational tool at this age. In all that we share, we are mindful of people's financial situation. These are only suggestions – please do not feel obliged to complete any of them.

- Talk together about how Pentecost is often named as the 'birthday of the Church', because it was when the apostles started to share the good news about Jesus – make a birthday card for the church
- Read the book 'Dinosaur Police' by Sarah McIntyre (or watch it online)
- Make finger puppets of the characters from the story, and act it out together
- Make a 'Wanted' poster for the dinosaur
- Make a pizza together – make a list of what toppings you could put on your pizza; look at the recipe for making pizza together; How can you put the toppings on the pizza to make sure everyone gets a fair share?
- Make a tally chart of the family's favourite pizza topping – use <https://www.purplemash.com/#app/tools/2count> to make a graph of the toppings
- Talk about how cooking changes the cheese, and how this is different from melting chocolate
- Draw, paint or make a collage of your favourite pizza

- Make pizzas out of playdough
- Use real money to set up a pretend pizza parlour (or general shop)
- Show your child how to research online to find out where pizza originally came from – find this on a world map
- Play a board game - Play a game together. Talk about taking it in turns and playing fairly.
